The absence of a presence


Alex is gone.

He has been honored on television, in newspapers, on the radio and on the Internet. More people are now more aware than ever of the life of this little grey bird and what his accomplishments meant to humanity. Paradoxically, now that he is absent his presence is felt even more strongly in world—and nowhere is that absence more apparent than in his home, the lab at Brandeis.

The lab no longer hears the commanding voice of a being that controlled it. No more do the students and staff hear orders being shouted out by Alex. No longer do Griffin and Wart have Alex, the taskmaster and cheerleader, overseeing their lessons. No more do they hear him calling out "Good parrot!" at a correct answer, or "C'mon, you try!" at more difficult tasks. They, like the humans in the lab, feel his absence keenly.



But in his absence, Alex is also an undeniable presence. Griff and Wart sometimes speak in Alex's voice. They use Alex's phrasing, Alex's intonation and Alex's inflection in certain words. Although he is gone, they are remembering Alex with one of his most singular characteristics, his voice.



The ability of parrots to remember the voice of those who have passed is not a new occurrence. It has been noted throughout the human-parrot experience. Centuries ago, an expedition visiting a Caribbean island village witnessed the remarkable. Noticing a village parrot that was speaking, the explorers asked the islanders what the bird was saying.

"We do not know," replied the villagers. "That parrot lived among a people that are no more, and the parrot is speaking their language, a tongue we do not understand." This parrot, the last living reminder of a civilization that had ceased to exist, paid homage to those he missed with his voice.

Thanks to Griffin and Wart, the legacy of Alex's voice will continue to be heard. But even more importantly,

the legacy of his work and what his life meant to science and humans in general will also continue to exist. Griffin and Wart are continuing the important work of human-parrot communication. How fortunate they are to have had the example of Alex, a very talented team member and colleague who showed them the miracles that could be accomplished.

Alex is gone...but what remains is the shadow of having loved and lived. The absence of his presence is a shadow we will hold close to our hearts as we move forward into the legacy that he left.

Remembering Alex

Now, more than ever, it is important to remember Alex. In remembering what he meant to us, it is crucial that we remember the example he set with his life—that of true communication between humans and parrots.

Alex opened a window that showed us the world through his eyes, but now it is time for Griffin and Wart to show us their abilities. They have their own special knowledge, their own particular realties, their own particular truths. And they will have marvelous knowledge to impart.
